Transparency of Ebola funds

Montserrado County:

Citizens rumor about the death of Ebola and claim that the government is deliberately delaying to announce an Ebola-free Liberia because they want to keep benefiting from international funds.

Margibi County:

It is rumored that President Ellen Johnson's recent visit abroad was to negotiate for resurgence the Ebola virus in Liberia and the need for a continuous flow of funds from donors including the international community.

River Gee County:

Liberians rumor that the vaccine is a government strategy to keep Ebola rolled out in the country and sponge on funds provided by the international community roll back the disease.

Complacency

Grand Geedeh County:

People rumor that Ebola is absent in bushmeat given significant drops in the Ebola cases across Liberia.

Bong County:

There is a rumor that bushmeat is now sold openly in the markets and consumed by families.

Bomi County:

It has been rumored that the Country Health Team is informing and encouraging people to cluster, shake hands and romance their lovers because Liberia is Ebola-free.

Maryland County:

In Saywokan, a town along the Cavalla river, Ebola is generally believed to be Liberian myth.

Recommendations

The Liberian government should increase information flow to local communities including those outside the capital, via local media channels, especially about the purpose of the President's recent visit abroad. As this rumor is clearly a consequence of the lack of trust in the system, it is important that communities feel that they are being kept informed about the process behind the declaration of Liberia as an Ebola-free country.

The government should touch base with the local media and the local population regularly and inform them on government measures to fight the disease and available sources of funding. It is suggested to make sure that the mechanisms for the disbursement of funding going to the Ebola response is transparent and that the local population trust the system behind it.

Recommendations

Clearly show to the public, the link between bushmeat and the Ebola virus. Also, it is important to reinforce campaigns against the consumption of bushmeat and clampdown on existing stocks if there are any in the markets.

Country Health Teams should focus on outdoor demonstration campaigns and also be available to respond to questions and to engage with local media to reinforce the message that Liberia is still not Ebola free and the risk of getting infected is still there. It is also suggested to investigate why this rumor has been spreading and what lies behind it.

Schools

Lofa County:

Parents rumor about the presence of Ebola in schools and fear sending their children to attend classes.

Grand Bassa County:

There will be an outbreak of Ebola in schools that have been reopened, according to another rumor.

It is rumored that the vaccine trial awareness were carried out in Zeonold town by a certain female health worker. Students and teachers fled the campus that day believing that she came to infect them with the virus.

Rivercess County:

It is rumored that the Ebola vaccine will be widely rejected in the Rivercess Country because its effects are unknown.

Nimba County:

It is rumored that the vaccine trials awareness were carried out in Zeonold town by a certain female health worker called Zoevah. Students and teachers fled the campus that day believing that she came to infect them with the virus.

Rivercess County:

It is rumored that the Ebola vaccine will be widely rejected in the Rivercess Country because its effects are unknown.

Recommendations

As this rumor is clearly coming form well funded fears of possible transmissions in between kids attending schools, it is suggested to organize testimonials of parents who send their children to school but also to show and discuss the measures that are being taken to protect the children and to make sure that schools are safe places for them.

Recommendations

There exists a communication gap between the local people and the authorities implementing the vaccine trial. As people still seem to be really confused about the trial, it is important to make sure that the eligibility for the vaccine and the criteria for the selection of the people getting the vaccine to be made more clear. Especially it is important to discuss the issue of EVD being present in the vaccine, and how this works.

It is also important to inform the local population about who's in charge of the vaccine trial and how they can be recognized/identified clearly. s.

Testimonies from Liberian volunteers who took the vaccine are very important. The volunteers should be integrated in widespread campaigns and it should also be restated that the vaccine is only given to people that voluntarily accepts to take it.



NATIONAL EBOLA SURVEY RESULTS

Internews is conducting recurring Information Needs Assessment via SMS surveys. The data presented (above) is the result of nearly 120 surveys conducted in the entire country over the course of the past 2 weeks. This data in particular is the aggregated response to the question: "What is the main question you have about Ebola in Liberia?" The sample distribution by geographic location (county level) was aligned with national statistics as best as possible. However, with SMS surveys, the response rate tends to be skewed towards the younger and male population. The responses we obtained were higher for the group 25/34; 45% of the responders were from that group, 41% in between 15 and 24, and 9% over 35 years old. 37% of the responders were female and 63% male. Raw data is available for organizations that would like to use it upon request.



Information Needs Analysis

LEGEND

Presence/Update: Questions in this category are related to the need of updates about the current situation in the country, or about the number of people affected and the current status of the outbreak.

EbolaReal: Those are questions that ask if Ebola is really a disease

Measures to end: Those questions ask about measures to end Ebola in the country or in general measures that people can take to prevent from being infected.

Origin: Those questions are specifically addressing the need for information on where Ebola came from. The inquiries are both about the location and the actual origin in time of the disease.

Future: those questions are referring to the future of the country after Ebola. Questions in this category look for information about what is happening to the money invested on Ebola, and how things will change after Ebola

VaccineTrial: Questions in this category specifically address the need for information about the Ebola Vaccine Trial.

Symptoms/Medical: this category is referring to questions that request information about symptoms and effects of Ebola, post-effects of Ebola and side affects. All the questions in this category are of medical nature **Number of Victims:** those are all questions that request information about the number of past Ebola cases and

current Ebola cases, but also about total number of deceased people until now.

Schools: Those are all questions that related to the re-opening of schools.

Survivors: Those questions are related to survivors and stigmatization

Other: Those are general questions that do not fall under any of the previous categories.


